Alder Hey's pioneering history

Founded in 1914, Alder Hey Children's Hospital has led the way in paediatric healthcare, from the early use of penicillin in children, to establishing the first neonatal surgery unit in the UK in 1953.

As one of the busiest children's hospitals in Europe, we are committed to continuing to provide the very best in pioneering treatment in a friendly and reassuring atmosphere, at some of the most difficult times for our patients and their families. We treat everything from common illness to highly complex and specialist conditions at our hospital in the City of Liverpool and also across many community sites and clinics throughout the North.

Alder Hey Children's Charity raises vital funds to help make Alder Hey a truly worldclass, patient-friendly hospital for the 330,000 patients and families we care for every year. Without the support of charitable donations, many of the outstanding facilities and innovations at Alder Hey could not be achieved.

The Charity helps fund a range of activities and projects which are designed to enhance and improve the lives of our amazing patients. This includes funding special projects such as play specialists and arts for health programmes as well as supporting research.

Money raised is also used to help Alder Hey continue to develop our new children's health campus next to the hospital, to fund distraction technology designed to reduce pain and anxiety in patients and to buy specialist medical equipment. Our ambition to improve children's health means we are using cutting edge technology to develop new ways to treat children more effectively through Research and Innovation. We're testing new sensor technology to help us identify infections and we're printing children's X-Rays in 3D so our surgeons can use these as a guide in surgery.

We're not satisfied treating children using today's medicines and technologies, we want to find the very best treatments we can. That's why we're working to develop the next generation of medicines and interventions that are even more effective, and safer.

Investing in Research & Innovation


The Charity provides vital investment in Research and Innovation. A recent multi-year grant supports five senior researchers and has enabled 10 clinicians

Arts for Health

We help fund the Arts for Health programme, reaching approximately 4,000 children and young people every year.

Alder Hey is...

- The first hospital in England to be awarded Investing in Children status. This accreditation is a quality mark for how we engage and work with our children to improve their care and experience during their time in hospital.
- A Centre of Excellence for cancer, spinal, heart and brain conditions.
- The UK's first Institute of Child Health and it remains one of only two in the country.
- A Centre of Excellence for Muscular Dystrophy and the first UK Centre of Excellence for Childhood Lupus.
- One of only four national centres for childhood epilepsy surgery.
- A designated Children's Major Trauma Centre.
- Home to Europe's first intro-operative 3-T MRI scanner which is pioneering technology for neurosurgery, reducing repeat operations in 90% of cases.
- A lead researcher into children's medicines, infection, inflammatory diseases and oncology.
- Is a renowned teaching hospital taking on over 500 medical students and 400 nursing students each year.
- Is leading the field in paediatric health research the UK Medicines for Children Research Network is hosted at Alder Hey in conjunction with the University of Liverpool.
- Is responsible for the health of more children than any other UK hospital -serving a population of 7.6 million.
- Is building a new Surgical Neonatal Unit which will be the first in the UK to pioneer the FiCare pathway, which involves parents in Alder Hey the care and treatment of their vulnerable newborns and allows family to stay with their babies 24 hours a day throughout their care at the hospital.

Our Appeals: 7in10 Children's Mental Health Appeal

In 2020 BBC One's Strictly Come Dancing head judge Shirley Ballas helped us to launch a major fundraising drive to transform the way mental health services are delivered to children and young people.

Highlighting that 7 out of 10 children and young people who experience a mental health condition in the UK have not had appropriate interventions at a sufficiently early age, Shirley backed and headed the appeal. We aimed to raise vital funds to enhance Inpatient and Community mental health services at Alder Hey, enabling more children to access the treatment they need at the time they

need it.

As part of wider plans to create a unique dedicated children's and young people's healthcare campus, the new development, which has recently opened it's doors, includes a new mental health outpatient facilities and a brand new twelve bed specialist inpatient mental health Unit, Sunflower House, alongside cross dependent community health services.

Located right next door to the hospital within a modern, child-friendly building and fronted by our award winning Chelsea Flower Show garden (see more below), the enhanced provision of mental health services will enable more children and young people to be seen and treated quickly by experienced, specialist clinicians. Patients and their families will be able to receive rapid and early access to co-ordinated multidisciplinary care, benefiting from the most up to date assessment and diagnosis facilities. The development enables Alder Hey's community services to link more closely with its specialist hospital services, enhancing care for children with long term conditions such as neurology, cardiology and infectious diseases.

The '7in10 Children's Mental Health Appeal' is very close to having raised the £3m required to ensure that the building itself is designed to the highest standards, creating the best possible child friendly environment for our young patients.

Alder Hey now home to an award winning Chelsea Garden

We are delighted to have a Silver Gilt award winning Chelsea Flower Show garden located at Alder Hey for the use and enjoyment of our patients, families, staff, volunteers and the general public. Designed by brothers Hugh and Howard Miller, and fully funded by Project Giving Back, the Alder Hey Urban Foraging Station is a woven landscape; it is about weaving together the young and old, green and urban, play and learning and Alder Hey Children's Hospital with its community. At its core is the aspiration to inspire children to lead active, healthy, pleasurable lives. The garden is infused with the magic of discovery inherent to foraging. Visitors first encounter the garden as nostalgic glimpses through rampant, blossoming hedgerows. Within, a sense of freedom prevails; explore, 'leave the

path', get lost in your own world. A design language of woven forms associated with foraging are abstracted into a woven landscape. Precast concrete 'strands' make up a picnic blanket laid over an undulating landscape with edible herbs growing through . The Alder Hey Urban Foraging Station will provide a haven for wellbeing and togetherness for all families and staff at Alder Hey. It will also be openly welcoming to the wider community, encouraging local residents to benefit from this unique garden and the foraging experience. Situated within established parkland, Alder Hey has a unique vision and outlook, incorporating the benefits of being in nature and the powerful impact that green space can have on our mental and physical health. The garden is located outside Sunflower House.



Our Appeals: Surgical Neonatal Appeal

Alder Hey has always pioneered neontal care - opening the world's first surgical neonatal unit in 1953. Our new Appeal will help create a unit offering 22 neonatal cots and featuring 18 individual family rooms where parents can be alongside their poorly new-borns 24 hours a day whilst they're receiving expert care, another first of its kind from one of the UK's premier leading edge hospitals.

Alder Hey Children's Emergency

The unit will address a shared concern between Liverpool Women's Hospital and Alder Hey that babies who need specialist surgery currently have to be transferred to Alder Hey to get the surgical care they need after which they are transferred back to Liverpool Women's Hospital to continue their specialist neonatal care, sometimes several times.

Funding from the Appeal will provide 'over and above' enhancements and equipment for both the clinical space and family areas, elevating the new Neonatal unit from a facility that provides families with a safe and secure environment for their new-borns, to a truly world-class facility that wraps around families with the most vulnerable babies in the region.

Our £3m Surgical Neonatal Appeal was launch by Liverpool Legend and Charity Champion, Jamie Carragher. Jamie, who was treated at Alder Hey's neonatal ward for the first six weeks of his life, launched the appeal for us in 2021.

Becoming a Trustee

Our Board of Trustees and its Purpose

The Board of Trustees at Alder Hey Children's Charity are responsible for providing oversight and leadership of the Charity, ensuring good governance and effective probity. The Trustees ensure there is a clear strategic direction in line with its charitable purpose. Just as importantly, they support and challenge the Chief Executive and Senior Management Team to enable the Charity to grow and thrive.

The Board has three sub-committees consisting of the Finance, Audit & Risk Committee; HR Committee; and Nominations Committee. In addition, there is a subsidiary Board for the wholly owned subsidiary company Alder Hey Promotions, through which trading activity in the charity shops is undertaken.

The Charity and Trust Boards work together towards a linked strategic aim of achieving a healthy future for children and young people. The Charity looks to achieve this by helping to fund the highest specification equipment and facilities, whilst bringing the added 'magic' extras for the best possible patient experience to each of our families.

Trustees have adopted the Charity Governance Code to ensure they are following good governance practices and they adhere to the Nolan Seven Principles of Public Life. Each year trustees review their own performance with the Chair of the Board and each trustee provides anonymous feedback on the performance of the Chair, ensuring all trustees are accountable within their role.

Time Commitment Required from our Trustees

The time commitment required from a trustee can vary but is approximately 6 half day meetings a year plus preparation time. This includes:


- Preparation for meetings.
- Attendance at four board meetings, usually taking around three hours in the day plus travel time.
- Attendance at other Board events including an annual away day and board development training.
- Attendance at important occasions including fundraising events and the staff value awards.
- Attendance at other key meetings and events as required.

It is likely that any new trustees may also be requested to join a subcommittee, depending on their individual specialism, and further time commitment will be required for this of approximately 2 days a year, including:

- Preparation for meetings.
- Attendance at four committee meetings, usually taking around two hours in the day.

Terms of Office

Trustees are usually appointed for a term of up to four years. Trustees may also be re-appointed at the end of their term of office, but no Trustee may serve more than 10 years.



Location of the Role

Most meetings are held on the Alder Hey Children's hospital site in Liverpool, but some may be offsite. Trustee Board meetings may also be held on-line or can be undertaken in a hybrid format. It is understood that there are occasions where trustees will need to attend remotely to fit in with their other commitments, however, it is expected that a proportion of meeting will be attended in person within any given year.

Main Duties

• Provide oversight to ensure that Alder Hey Children's Charity adheres to and is run in accordance with its charitable purpose, governing documents, charity law, company law and any other relevant legislation or regulations.

• Determine the strategic objectives for the Charity and approve any associated business plans and budgets, ensuring the financial stability of the organisation.

• Ensure that the organisation applies its resources exclusively in pursuance of its charitable objectives (i.e. the charity must not spend money on activities that are not included in its own objects, however worthwhile or charitable those activities are) for the benefit of the public.

• Monitor the Charity's performance in relation to its plans and budgets.

• Provide oversight to ensure the protection and effective management of the Charity's assets, including any investment funds.

• Ensure the effective and efficient administration of the Charity, including having appropriate policies, procedures and controls in place.

• Ensure that key risks are being identified, monitored and controlled effectively.

• Review and approve the group financial statements.

• Provide support and, where necessary, challenge to Alder Hey children's Charity Executive & Senior Management Team in the exercise of their delegated authority and systems of internal control.

• Follow proper and formal arrangements for the appointment, supervision, support, appraisal and remuneration of the Senior Management Team and Chief Executive.

• Keep abreast of changes in Alder Hey Children's Charity's operating environment.

• Contribute to the broader promotion of Alder Hey Children's Charity's objects, aims and reputation by applying skills, expertise, knowledge and utilising appropriate contacts.

• Attend and actively participate in Board meetings (being adequately prepared and ready to contribute to discussions).

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• Be a positive representative for the Charity and work to safeguard, uphold and promote thebrand and values.

Our recent partnerships with Johnson's Baby and Proctor & Gamble ensure our reach extends across the whole

country.
